

THE ROAD TO MIGRATION

According to the UNCHR report of 2018, an estimated 2,275 people died or went missing in their efforts to cross the Mediterranean Sea. Though around 1,335 were estimated dead in 2019, 123,663 migrants reached Europe. In 2020 the report shows that 1,401 people were dead and missing while 95,031 migrants arrived in Europe




There exists a deep interconnectedness between human beings and the creation through mindful encounters with nature: This encounter can be through reflection, sacred listening, and prayer.

Biblical foundation (Gen 2:4-3:24)

ROOT CAUSES OF CLIMATE CRISIS

The Impact of Neoliberal Capitalism on Climate and Environmental Crisis






It said mining companies forcibly removed people from their homes and farmland. The recent report also said people were attacked, including sexually attacked, and also had their property destroyed or damaged."



The ritual of burying the placenta or the umbilical cord after the birth of a child is practiced across the globe.


In many African cultures the umbilical cord is usually buried under a tree as a symbolic act of ongoing life.



The burying of the placenta and umbilical cord in the earth


Among the Kikuyu from Kenya and many other tribal groups of Africa, the umbilical Cord is usually buried in an uncultivated field along with a tree, covered with grain and grass as a symbol of fertility. There is a silent prayer that the mother's womb should remain more fertile and fresher for other children by this ritual.

Totemic beliefs

A totem is an emblematic animal or tree expressing indigenous African traditions' deep kinship with creation. It instills a strong relationship and peaceful cohabitation between the tribe and the totemic animals, trees, or other creatures apart from human beings.

Youth Empowerment: Toward sustainable action (Ezekiel 36: 6-12)



Educational, cultural formation and ministerial or pastoral activities.



Ezekiel gives us a wonderful vision of a restored relationship between humanity and the rest of creation (Ezekiel 36:6-12).

LIBERATIVE EDUCATION

Bishop PAUL Verryn, in his ministry, understood that education is a key liberative empowerment in caring for creation. He says that "[he sees] human liberation and empowerment of youth through education as being one of the many possible solutions" to the climate and environmental crisis.



Change of cultural and curriculum formation

Cultural beliefs and environmental management should be part of a curriculum that teaches children how to manage and protect the environment at this time of protracted climate change.

They should learn theories and practices that restore their relationship with the environment so that they can know how to deal with the crisis.



Pastoral Response and Ministerial Response (Accompany, advocate (preaching), serve!

Pope Francis: A call to a deep ecological conversion: A call to have a new look on creation and see God who dwells in every creature. To see creation in the eyes of God.

<u>Nature as a sacrament</u>: Creation is sacred and consecrated by God. The liturgical context of redemption includes the whole of creation.

Biblical hermeneutics from Earth perspective: to develop techniques of reading the text to discern and retrieve alternate traditions where the voice of the Earth community has been suppressed.

Empowering and mitigating change through activism: empower youths so that they may be able to use their classrooms, dormitories, and social media such as Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and WhatsApp brochures and participate in petition signing to raise awareness and advocate for environmental and climate safety.

Preach the ecological account of creation, such as in the Book of Job and Isaiah: None anthropological vision of creation.

INDIGENOUS SPIRITUALITY in the world.

The church can also valorize indigenous spirituality

Jack Forbes, "Indigenous Americans: spirituality and Ecos" Says: "For us truly, there are no surroundings. I can lose my hands and still live, I can lose my legs and still live, I can lose my eyes and still live. But if I lose the air I die. If I lose the sun, I die. If I lose the earth, I die. If I lose the water, I die. If I lose the plan and animals, I die. All of these things are more apart of me and more essential to every breath than is my so-called body."

The earth is my real body. We are not autonomous self-sufficient beings as Europe mythology and Christianity teaches.
